

Administrator's Update to Residents

The 2018 year began with a frenzy of projects in the City: bidding a road resurfacing project which encompassed 2.5 miles of road; the new Public Works Facility was in its final stages of construction; and two proposed developments were being discussed. Here is a brief outline of the status of each project.

2018 Pavement Improvement Project

The City awarded a contract to GMH Asphalt Corporation to complete a milling of the top few inches of roads in the Pheasant Run neighborhood, Schendels Woods neighborhood, and River Road between 8th St NE and 15th St NE. The project was completed during the summer months with final restoration happening in the beginning of August. This project fell under the City's no assessment policy and therefore was fully paid by the City. The City was able to use Street Capital funds that were previously set aside for this type of project.

Public Works Facility

The facility was completed in February, with an open house being held in May. The facility was a needed upgrade from the previous space of 2,600 sq. feet. The new space has allowed for more efficient operations of the Public Works department; it has allowed more in-house services to be conducted like routine equipment maintenance; and has allowed Public Works to grow as a department bringing new services to the residents. The City has also purchased used (new to us) equipment to increase our equipment inventory. As we continuously borrow equipment from other cities, we purchased equipment that others can borrow from us, in turn, returning the favor.

Crow River Heights West future Additions

On June 19th City Council conditionally approved a Preliminary Plat for Crow River Heights West

Future Additions. This plat is an extension/completion of the already platted neighborhoods of Crow River Heights. More information can be found on the City website's "City Projects Page."

Hanover Cove

This project is located south of 8th St. NE and west of River Road, on a property commonly known as the Duinck Pit. A plan consisting of a mix of patio homes and single-family homes was supported by the City Council. The next step is for the City to review an Environmental Assessment Worksheet (EAW) and Preliminary Plat. The EAW is currently out for public comment until October 3rd, with the Planning Commission review at the September 24th meeting. Staff anticipates a tentative review of the Preliminary Plat to be brought to Planning Commission this year. More information can be found on the City website's "City Projects Page."

Mayor's Minute: History of a City Project

In March of 2008, the Hanover City Council recognized a need for additional space for the City's Public Works department and set in motion the eventual purchase in September 2008 of 10 acres across from City Hall on 5th street for a new Public Works site. After purchasing this property, the City continued to rent storage space at various places for city equipment over the next nine years. In 2016, realizing that our current system of paying to store equipment was costly and inefficient, our Council went to work to finish what had been started in 2008. After finalizing the choice of building design and contractors, work began in 2017. I think everyone can agree that the outcome was worth the wait. The City now has a Public Works building that allows for employees to be very productive in as well as taking on additional tasks throughout the city. All this was done under budget and without increasing the City tax rate. At the open house this year, Hanover citizens enjoyed touring the facility and checking out the equipment now under one roof. The response was overwhelmingly positive. Thanks to Kinghorn Construction, City Staff, and Council for making this project a success.

Discussion of Land Acquisition for Cold Storage Facility

Mayor Paullin introduced the item. Buchholtz stated that the City needs a cold storage facility to provide indoor storage of new equipment. He noted that the maintenance facility is completely full. He said that he is seeking a long-term solution from the City Council for the future needs of the City public works and maintenance departments. He recommended acquiring additional property for the cold storage facility. He said that the additional property could also be the location for a future public works facility 15-20 years into the future. He said that if the City Council did not want to acquire additional property, he wanted the City Council to realize that meant placing the cold storage facility to the east of the existing maintenance facility. He said any future expansions would be onto City Hall. Buchholtz then provided cost estimates for various pieces of property located near City Hall.

Malewicky stated that he would like to gather some feedback from the residents prior to making a decision. Buchholtz stated that he could write an article for the newsletter explaining the City's future needs.

CONSENSUS of the City Council was to authorize the City Administrator to negotiate a price for land with various land owners for a public works facility.

MOTION by Pinor, second by Kolasa, to authorize staff to send out the purchase agreement without the contingency language, authorize staff to contract with an firm to conduct a Phase 1 environmental review to be finished by September 16, and to authorize staff to contract with an architect to review the site for its suitability to construct public buildings upon, with such report to be finished by September 15.

Purchase of Renier Property

Paullin introduced the item. Buchholtz stated that Braun Intertec completed the Phase 1 Environmental Site Assessment which found that there were no recognized environmental conditions in connection with the site, except that "the potential exists for the presence of buried solid waste that could be considered a hazardous substance or petroleum product" and that there is no need for a Phase 2 environmental site assessment to be completed. He said that an architect reviewed the 1999 Geotechnical Report and determined that the site is buildable, with some soil correction work.

Squires provided an overview of the proposed purchase agreement. He said the purchase price was set at \$350,000. He said a new addition was that it is the City's responsibility to pay for any survey and application for the lot split to have the Property subdivided from the larger tax parcel. He recommended that the City Council approve an ordinance amendment recommended by the Planning Commission that would allow for administrative lots splits on parcels described by metes and bounds to facilitate the City meeting the closing date referenced in the purchase agreement. He noted that Section 8 is a new provision stating that the City is buying the property "as is." He said that is why the City had conducted the Phase 1 environmental site assessment.

Buchholtz noted that the City will be utilizing funds in its Capital Improvement Fund for the purchase of the parcel.

MOTION by Kolasa, second by Paullin, to approve the purchase agreement between the City of Hanover and James J. Renier Revocable Trust for purchase of a 10 acre parcel on 5th Street NE.

Look. Listen. Learn.

Fire Prevention Week is October 8-13th this year and the theme is Look. Listen. Learn. Fires can happen anywhere so be aware of your surroundings, make sure smoke detectors are working, and plan an escape route.

In the US, fire departments respond to an average of one home fire every 86 seconds. Seven people per day die in a home fire. Cooking is the leading cause of home fires and related injuries. Other causes of home fires include smoking and heating equipment.

Every spring and fall, usually when daylight savings time begins and ends, batteries should be changed in smoke detectors and a test performed. Working smoke alarms cut the risk of dying in a home fire in half.

Having a home escape plan will help every member of the family get out of the house when there is a fire and there are only minutes to get out safely. Make sure everyone knows two ways out of every room and that there is a designated outside meeting place such as a light pole, mailbox, or tree that is a safe distance from the house. Practice a fire drill, both at night and during the day, making sure that children can escape on their own in case an adult cannot help them.

If a smoke alarm sounds, **GET OUT AND STAY OUT!** Never go back into the house for people or pets. If there is smoke in the house, **GET LOW AND GO** under the smoke to escape. Once outside and at the designated safe meeting area, **CALL 911.**

Emerald Ash Borer Discovered

The Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) has been discovered in Wright County and the Minnesota Department of Agriculture (MDA) has placed the County under an emergency quarantine. It was found in the City of Clearwater.

The quarantine limits the movement of firewood and ash material out of the county in order to reduce the risk of allowing the insect to spread further. The EAB larvae kill ash trees by tunneling under the bark and feeding on the part of the tree that moves nutrients up and down the trunk. Minnesota is home to approximately one billion ash trees, the most of any state in the nation.

There are three easy steps to help keep the Emerald Ash Borer from spreading:

- Don't transport firewood. Buy it locally from approved vendors. Burn it where you buy it!
- Be aware of the quarantine restrictions.
- Watch ash trees for signs of infection.

Halloween Recycling

Here are some tricks and treats for reducing Halloween waste before and after the holiday!

Pass out treats that are not to eat

Skip the plastic items that will end up cluttering up the house and select useful items like pencils, coins, or even Legos!

Give earth-friendly treats

There are some candies that have recyclable wrappers such as Hershey's Kisses. The Mars Company is experimenting with packaging made from corn and would break down without harming the environment.

Be green with candy wrappers

Dress for success

Plan Halloween costume with a post-holiday life in mind. Can the costume be saved for a younger child? Arrange a costume swap so that kids have a "new" costume each year. Or create this year's costume out of recycled materials!

Each small part done to recycle or re-use adds up and keeps plastics out of the oceans and items out of the landfill.



Absentee Voting is Available Now

In Minnesota, residents can vote early with an absentee ballot starting 46 days before Election Day. Hanover residents have two options: use an absentee ballot to vote by mail or vote early in person at City Hall a week prior to the Election.

To vote by mail, residents may stop by City Hall during business hours to request a ballot. An application form is completed and the voting process is explained. The resident will then take the ballot and vote in the privacy of their own home. A witness will be needed and can

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be either a registered Minnesota voter or a notary. Put the completed ballot in the proper envelopes and mail it. Be sure that there is enough time for the ballot to reach the proper office before Election Day otherwise the ballot will not be counted. Absentee ballots may be tracked on the Secretary of State's website.

A resident may also request a ballot by filling out an online application form at www.sos.state.mn.us and clicking on Elections & Voting.

Starting October 30th, residents may vote in person at City Hall during business hours. The procedure is the same as requesting an absentee ballot in person, but the voter will put the ballot in the ballot box instead of mailing it.

City Hall will be open the Saturday before the election, November 3rd, from 10 am to 3 pm to allow residents to vote early.

Snowplowing 101

Snow will soon be falling and snowplowing will start.

The criteria for determining when to plow includes snow accumulation with continual snowfall, drifting snow, icing or freezing rain, and the timing of the snowfall in relationship to heavy use of the streets. Public safety and safety of the plow drivers is taken into consideration in order to allow effective and efficient removal of snow.

Residents are reminded that from November 1st to April 1st of the next year, there is **NO PARKING** allowed on any city street overnight. Violators will be ticketed and/or towed at the discretion of the snowplow operators or the sheriff's department.


Residents may also want to wait to clear their driveways until the plows have been through the neighborhood. If this is not possible, additional clearing may need to be done after the plows have gone past.

Additional reminders include:

- Don't crowd the plow! Not only is snow removal equipment large, expect it to be backing up frequently.
- Be patient! Plowing and sanding take time.
- Do not plow, push or blow snow onto or across the street! This is prohibited by state law.
- Items such as irrigation heads, landscaping, fences, etc. that are in the public right of way may be damaged and are the owner's responsibility to repair.
- Keep garbage and recycling bins out of the street so plows do not hit them.
- Be a good neighbor: clear snow from around mailboxes and fire hydrants.
- Residents must clear the portion of sidewalk that abuts their property.

What is the purpose of a pond?

Ponds can be a pleasing feature in a neighborhood, but they also serve a purpose. Ponds that have been designed and constructed, not ones that are naturally occurring, are used to collect and clean water runoff from homes and yards, as well as the streets. The water then travels into the storm water sewer system, the lake, or the river.

When collecting and storing the storm water runoff the pond also collects pollutants: fertilizer, insecticides, pesticides, garbage, pet waste, oil and more. Residents can use environmentally friendly lawn products, pick up after pets and keep garbage off the ground to help keep ponds working correctly.

Dumping leaves and grass into the area around the pond affects how the pond works and how it filters the water. In the City of Hanover, it is illegal to dump grass or leaves into any of the ponds within the city limits. Residents are encouraged to use their free access card to the St. Michael Compost and Brush Site to dump grass and leaves. Still need an access card? Visit City Hall during business hours, show id and complete the necessary form.



This is a “dry” pond located in Hanover where leaves were dumped or blown in by a leaf blower. This is not okay to do and prevents the pond from filtering the storm water runoff as it is supposed to do.

Neighborhood Ice

It will soon be snowing and the Public Works staff will be out creating the neighborhood rinks again this year. Upon the first snowfall that has enough snow, the area will be packed to create a white surface ready for water. The rinks will be systematically flooded and smoothed. Once the layers are built up and the weather stays cold, it’s ready for skating! Rinks are currently planned for Mallard Park and Cardinal Circle Park.

The Hanover Athletic Association will also have a rink located west of City Hall.


