

## Elections Judges Needed for 2020: Apply Now!

Are you looking for a way to get involved with your community, but you do not have the ability to dedicate consistent time throughout the year? Becoming an election judge is the perfect opportunity! The City is in need of Election Judges to help administer the 2020 elections. The time commitment would consist of approximately five hours of training, then three different election days. Judges may choose either a half day or a full day of duties for the election day. By becoming an election judge, you would be provided the necessary training to be knowledgeable of your duties, receive compensation for your time (we even provide your

meals), and be part of a group of individuals who are coming together and helping their community.

New for 2020 is what is known as a Presidential Nomination Primary (PNP), this Election will be held on March 3, 2020. The purpose of the PNP is to supplement the historical caucus model used in Minnesota for many years. Voters will be able to vote for major political party presidential candidates in a similar fashion to other elections. Results of the PNP bind the election of delegates for each participating party. This means that the results guide the delegates but does not determine

the names of candidates that will appear on the state general election ballot. The following website can be visited for more information on the new PNP:

The state primary election will be held on August 11, 2020, and the state general election will be held on November 3, 2020. As with all elections, this presents an opportunity for residents to be involved at the local level with their government. # Neighborhood Watch Program

The Neighborhood Watch Program is a community-based program proven to reduce crime. The Watch was first sponsored in 1972 by the National Sheriff's Association. It unites law enforcement agencies, local organizations and individual citizens in a community-wide effort to reduce crime.

Residents learn how to make themselves and their homes more secure, watch out for one another in the neighborhood, and report suspicious activity to the Sheriff's department.

Residents can start a Neighborhood Watch Program by forming a small planning committee and set up a date for the initial meeting. Contact Sgt. Brian Johnson at 763-684-2366 to arrange having a deputy attend

the first neighborhood meeting. The deputy will provide training to the residents. At least half of the neighborhood should be attending in order to have a Neighborhood Watch be effective.



Also at the meeting, a coordinator and block captains will be selected.

They are responsible for organizing meetings and relaying information. Establishing a phone tree or text tree will allow information to be sent quickly to the residents. The neighborhood groups should meet at least twice a year.

Becoming involved in the neighborhood creates a strong and united community.

# Report Messy Construction Sites

As more developments start the building process, residents may notice more activity throughout Hanover. If a site appears dirty and cluttered, residents can help the City by reporting their concerns.

Permitted constructions projects are required to use practices to keep sediment and debris contained within the project area. In addition, project sites require planning and organization to keep work area safe and neat. The City routinely inspects active sites.

Whenever conditions are observed that require corrective action, notices are sent to property owners or builders stating City expectations, outlining the necessary remedy, and allowing a certain amount of time for compliance.

If a resident has a concern about a project, or feel a code violation exists, please report the concern via the Contact Us tab on the City's website, [www.hanovermn.org](http://www.hanovermn.org). By filling out the form, it provides documentation for the City and

helps in resolving the issue.

## Trees Planted at Settler's Park Ball Field

Public Works staff planted 40 trees as the last step in the Settler's Park Ball Field redesign. The trees were planted mid-June and create a backdrop just outside the ball field fence.

A variety of trees were planted providing color throughout the year. The trees are white pines, Sienna Glen maples, Showtime crabapples, Black Hills spruce and American Larch, more commonly known as tamarack.

An irrigation system was put in place in order to water the newly planted trees and keep them growing in their new location.



# Sprinkling Restrictions June through September

Joint Powers Water Board enforces calendar sprinkling from June 1st through September 30th. Odd addresses may water on odd numbered days and even addresses on even numbered days. Days begin at midnight and end at midnight. Residents **MAY NOT** irrigate between 10 am and 7 pm. A violation will cost \$75 on the first occurrence and will increase by \$25 for each additional violation.

New sod and seed is exempt from watering restrictions for 60 days only and the Water Department must be notified. Hand watering is allowed any time. Children may run through a moveable sprinkler at any time.



## Emergency Planning: What to Do

Emergency situations and natural disasters can happen at any time of the year. Most people consider summer the time when most emergencies happen due to severe weather.

In a widespread emergency such as the July 5th storm that took down the high line, City Hall will become the Emergency Operations Center.

A Night to Unite celebration takes a little motivation, some planning, a lot of cooperation, and the willingness to enjoy time with your neighbors!

- Complete the registration form located on the Night to Unite Page and send it to City Hall or drop it off.
- The Hanover Fire Department, local law enforcement, and Hanover City Council members will be visiting the neighborhoods on August 6th. Be sure to let City Hall know who you would like to visit your celebration—the **deadline is August 1st**.
- Get organized! Share the responsibilities of planning and being in charge of the invitations/flyers, activities, kids' entertainment, food, set up, and clean up.

### 10 Reasons to Have a Night to Unite Celebration

1. To have fun! No excuse is needed to celebrate!
2. To meet your neighbors. When you know who lives in your neighborhood, you are more likely to identify strangers or suspicious people.
3. To increase the sense of belonging in your neighborhood.
4. To organize a neighborhood watch group.
5. To make community connections. When you know people, you can exchange skills or resources and perhaps organize a book club, babysitting co-op, or find new friends for your children.
6. To "use" the street for one day.
7. To meet long-time neighborhood residents and learn the neighborhood's history.
8. To update your neighborhood map, including all your neighbor's names, phone numbers, and emails.
9. To remind each other of crime prevention basics such as locking doors, closing the garage door, etc.
10. To start a neighborhood tradition of getting together at least once a year!



# What can Residents do to protect water quality?

Fertilizers, leaves, grass clippings, animal waste, and eroded soil are all sources of phosphorus. When they are swept or washed into the street or nearest storm drain, they end up in the local lake or river. Residents can do their part to protect water quality by doing the following:

- ◆ Buy phosphorus-free lawn fertilizer.
- ◆ Apply fertilizer at the recommended rate. Late summer is the best time. Don't fertilize before a storm. Never apply to frozen ground.
- ◆ Keep soil, leaves, and lawn clippings out of the street.
- ◆ Mow higher. Keeping the grass length to 2.5-3 inches is healthier for the lawn.
- ◆ Pick up pet waste promptly. Pet waste can contain harmful bacteria as well as nutrients that cause excess algae and weed growth in lakes and rivers.
- ◆ Control soil erosion around the house. When left bare, soil is easily washed away with rain, carrying phosphorous with it. Soil erosion can be prevented by keeping soil covered with vegetation or mulch.


# Safe From the Outside World to be updated


